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# ACADEMIC INTEGRITY - SCHEDULE OF RESPONSES AND PENALTIES FOR ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

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#### 1. DETERMINATIONS

These responses and penalties are to be applied by Academic Integrity Advisers (AIAs) and College Academic Misconduct Committees (CAMCs) when they have determined that student academic misconduct has taken place. These responses will be recorded on students' internal records. Outcomes of suspension or exclusion from the University for disciplinary reasons will be recorded on students' transcripts.

AlAs and CAMCs can also direct educational corrective action and academic counselling to take place if students have made acknowledgement or referencing mistakes whether or not academic misconduct has been intended.

AlAs and CAMCs must use discretion to apply responses and penalties after all the facts and circumstances of individual cases have been considered. While flexibility and discretion in imposing penalties is a case by case individualised decision, penalties must be aligned with the type and degree of academic misconduct and the circumstances involved.

## Academic misconduct: as per the Statute includes

- a) cheating, plagiarism or any other conduct engaged in by a student with a view to gaining for himself, herself or another person an unfair or unjustified advantage in an examination or assessment, or in relation to or for a formal examination or assessment, whether such advantage occurs or not;
- b) conduct which constitutes a breach of any rules relating to a formal examination or assessment;
- c) conduct engaged in by a student with a view to gaining for himself, herself or another person an unfair or unjustified advantage in relation to any other requirements of a course or subject, including without limitation class attendance or participation requirements pertaining to placements, whether such advantage occurs or not; and
- d) any prescribed conduct.

The Statute further defines academic misconduct as being either serious or minor.

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### Serious academic misconduct includes academic misconduct which

- a) is, or appears from the evidence to be, accompanied by a clear or demonstrable intention to flout or contravene the University's requirements for academic honesty (including those set out in this Statute and the AIP, the GRP or any other policy or procedure regarding academic misconduct);
- b) is, or appears from the available evidence to be, carefully and deliberately planned, repetitive, organised or systematic in nature; or
- c) is, or appears from the available evidence to be, significant in scale or scope

**Minor academic misconduct** means academic misconduct which, in all the circumstances, falls short of serious academic misconduct; **Cheating:** per the Statute, means cheating in relation to a formal examination or assessment and includes a failure to comply with any reasonable direction or instruction of an officer, employee or agent of the University relating to the conduct of the formal examination or assessment.

### 2. POSSIBLE RESPONSES AND PENALTIES

The list of possible responses provided below is hierarchical, escalating from least to most severe. The AIAs and CAMCs can apply more than one response or penalty as appropriate.

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### 3. POSSIBLE CASES

Minor academic misconduct involving students who have not previously studied at university in Australia can be due to the student's lack of familiarity with the University's requirements. In such cases, the AIA can use the opportunity to educate the student and reinforce the University's requirements rather than penalising the student. The AIA who directed an educational response would record a brief notice of such action in the central University record repository. Any repeat offence suggesting that the student is ignoring the educational advice would result in a penalty for academic misconduct.

Circumstances and considerations are taken into account when applying a response and penalty.

- Is the student new to tertiary study?
- Is the student new to study in Australia?
- Was the student educated overseas?
- Is this a first or repeat offence?
- Has the student completed the Academic Integrity Module (AIM)?
- Was the misconduct significant in scale or scope?
- · Was the misconduct deliberate with a clear intention of cheating?
- Was the misconduct carefully and deliberately planned?
- Was the action intending to give the student a significant advantage?
- · Was the action intending to give the student an unjustified advantage?
